BRAVO SPIRIT to ALWAYS FIRST - 410th HANDS OVER AOR TO 401st

Transfer of Authority

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With a light haze in the sky in the early morning hours of 14 June 2007 the 92nd Military Police Battalion hosted the Transfer of Authority Ceremony from the 410th Military Police Company to the 401st Military Police Company. The ceremony which is a tradition from the outgoing unit to the incoming unit signifies the completion of the Relief In Place (RIP) process.

Captain Copeland along with First Sergeant Sneed unfurled the 401st guidon which has been furled - or cased - since just before the units departure from Fort Hood in May. The furling of the guidon is a signal that the 401st has completed it's mission at Fort Hood and is set to deploy. When the unit unfurls the

guidon, it is a signal that the unit has deployed and assumed a new mission. Likewise, when the 410th furled their guidon it was a sign that their mission in Iraq had been completed and that they were re-deploying back to Fort Hood.

The 410th originally deployed in June 2006 from Fort Hood and served in the Baghdad area of operations. The Soldiers of the 401st wish the Vipers a Happy return to Fort Hood and thank them for a job well done!

92nd Military Police Battalion “ON THE WATCH”

Once a Soldier of the Gauntlet, always a Soldier of the Gauntlet...but just for the next 14 months or so, the Gunfighters will be “On the Watch.” The 401st has temporarily detached from the 720th Military Police Battalion and attached to the 92nd Military Police Battalion, from Fort Benning, Georgia. Although the 720th is also deployed, the 401st mission falls under that of the 92nd, and not of the 720th. LTC Frank Y. Rangel Jr., Commander 720th MP BN was there to greet the Gunfighters when they stepped off the plane that transported them from Kuwait, showing his continuing support for the unit. Commanded by LTC Leonard A. Cosby and CSM

Patrick Dawson, the 92nd is responsible for Military Police Operations in the Western District of Baghdad to the Syrian border. During the deployment, the 92nd MP BN also falls under the 89th Military Police Brigade, also from Fort Hood. The 89th is the parent Brigade for the 720th and 401st...confused yet?! Well, to make it easy, sometimes when units are needed there are cross selections made based upon unit rotation history, time in CONUS, and other key facts - that decision is made by FORSCOM. The 92nd, when at home station at Fort Benning, falls under the 16th Military Brigade. Due to rotations that are beyond the Military Police Corps

control, sometimes units get miss matched on deployment rotations...like right now. The Battalion has been deployed since 2 November 2006 and is not due back until Jan 08 - they are scheduled to be relieved by the 716th MP BN from Fort Campbell, Kentucky. The Battalion itself is very young, having only been activated on 16 April 2006 at Fort Benning. Prior to the 92nd's activation there was no headquartered Military Police at Fort Benning. The 92nd shares MP duties throughout Iraq with several other MP Battalions including 720th which is responsible for operations south of Baghdad. The 401st looks forward to their mission.

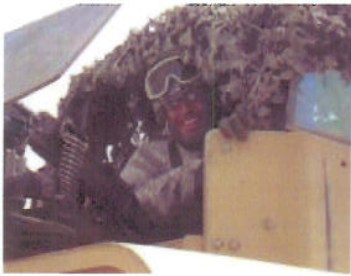

Since the arrival of the 3rd Platoon "Hooligans" in the theater of operations, we have moved from a tent containing 76 other Soldiers in Kuwait to tents with approximately 24 Soldiers. As of 17 June, we are currently living in trailers with one or two roommates and have some nice creature comforts like electricity and air conditioning. Some of the trailers even have basic cable installed in them. Most of the Soldiers of 3rd Platoon have access to the internet, either in their trailers or at the battalion internet trailer that is located just a stones throw away from our living area. Based upon prior deployments, mail has really improved in theater. Many Soldiers have started receiving mail from the first day that we arrived at our new home. The turn around for mail is between 5-7 days. That is a long ways from the two to three weeks from OIF 1.

The Soldiers of 3rd Platoon have been spending a lot of "down time" working on their various pieces of equipment that has been recently transferred from the 410th MP Co. Due to all of the increases in protective measures taken on our vehicles, they seem to require more attention than in the past. Communications equipment and weapons are just as important as our vehicles and have needed special care

requiring the Soldiers of this platoon to spend tireless hours ensuring that they are in top condition.

With all of the new equipment that we have been receiving in the last few weeks, the Soldiers have had to remain flexible to all the changes



within the schedule and have done an outstanding job doing so. The training process that the 3rd Platoon Soldiers have completed has been a great accomplishment. They were trained in just eight short days on everything the 410th Military Police Company had learned in 12 months. Now they are tak-

ing what they have learned and altering it for their own uses. 1st Squad, which is lead by SGT Seli is responsible for escorting the Company Commander throughout the entire "Gunfighter" footprint. 2nd Squad led by SSG Giuffre and 3rd Squad led by SSG Watts are currently sharing responsibilities at the Kadhra Local IP Station. Those two squads have a tough job ahead of them, but they are working closely to develop this IPS station.

It has been a busy month for all of the Soldiers of 3rd Platoon and they have all supported each task and mission with the utmost enthusiasm. Environmental Mid-tour Leaves (EML) will be beginning during the month of July. The order of merit list is based off of the Soldiers previous deployments. This is going to allow those Soldiers who have deployed on numerous occasions to be able to pick certain times when they may go on leave. All Soldiers have submitted their prospective leave dates and the platoon leadership is attempting to accommodate them, as mission allows. The Soldiers of 3rd Platoon are doing an excellent job in this tough environment and they would like to thank all of the family members for their support from back at home.

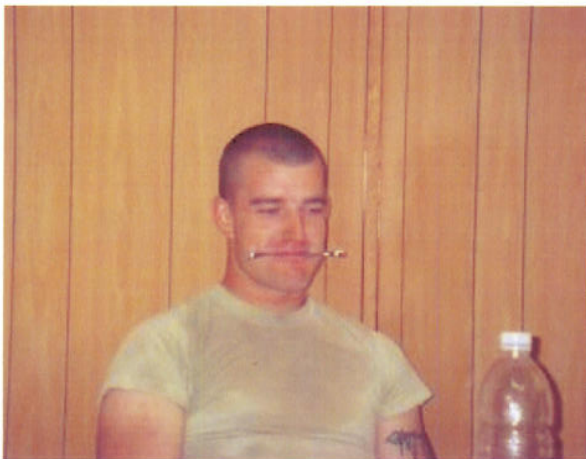
TAKING A BREAK. Motor Sergeant Tyrell Tompkins takes a few minutes to relax after performing services on a HMMWV.

TRI-CARE works on a regional system and your medical care and needs must be transferred when you leave the area.

We are also still in need of a CARE Team. This is a critical need in supporting families in the future if we should ever have a need to call them out and we can't afford to wait for a casualty and be caught short. Basically we need 2 – 4 volunteers who can attend the training provided by

ACS, be available at a moments notice and who can be able to assist in the first critical days after a family has been notified (usually the first 72 hours). I know this is a lot to ask because everyone is busy with kids, jobs and taking care of their own families, but we need to look inside ourselves and see where we can make a difference and show those in need that WE CARE. We have had plenty of volunteers for the support piece to this critical need in our unit and I thank all who have signed on to do this. If you feel that you are up to the challenge, contact Tammy Johnson or myself so we can arrange the training.

401st MP Company FRG Completes Volunteer Project

Keeping with the spirit of the last FRG meeting on 13 June, the 401st MP Company completed their first volunteer project.

On 30 June 2007, several volunteers donned their "get dirty" clothes and gave it their best try as landscape engineers. At 0930 the Gunfighter Posse assembled at the 720th Military Police Battalion Memorial, adjacent to BLDG 16001 on Battalion Avenue, and put into action some plans to spruce up the memorial.

Amid high hopes and high humidity, weeds were plucked and pathways were edged before the real dirty work of planting could begin. Tammy Johnson spearheaded the mission by receiving approximately \$150 of donated plants and materials from Oma's Garten Pflazen at 2301 Old FM 440 Road in Killeen.

With a pallet of color (red, white, purple and yellow) in hand waiting to be transplanted into soil, the plants were laid out and then planted. Many of the children on

hand were willing to get dirty and were motivated by the discovery of earth worms in the soil. To my knowledge no earth worms were hurt in the planting process, nor were they mistaken for spaghetti and eaten.

After the planting was completed a healthy spray of water was applied to the plants and maybe a few children. Brandy Godbout, daughter of SGT Neal and Esther Neal, seemed to spend the most time trotting through the falling water and it was toss up as to who received more; Brandy or the flowers.

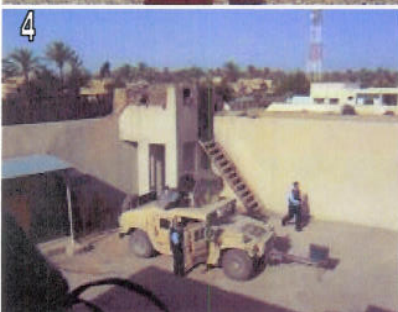

Kid's Corral Resilient Children

Excerpt from an article by Julia Pfaff, National Military Family Association, www.nmfa.org

Below are nine things that I have learned that help our children on their paths to becoming resilient.

Recognize your feelings and teach your children to recognize theirs. Help your child understand that what they are feeling is normal but to channel those emotions in positive directions rather than lashing out in anger or withdrawing.

Express your love and approval of your children. Encourage them to express themselves through creative means such as play, art or writing.

Self care. Make sure that you take care of yourself. Don't ignore your needs by devoting your full self to your children or volunteering. The better you take

care of yourself, the better you will be able to help your children.

Interact with your family, friends, and community. Don't be afraid to ask for help. In fact seek it out. Look for other trusted adults who can both help with your children and who your children naturally gravitate towards. These adults can also help your children sort through their feelings. Sometimes a child will share with another adult something he or she will not share with a parent.

Listen deeply and watch your children. Help them to understand.

Information. Give your children good accurate and unemotional information. Children know when something is wrong. Don't

lie to your child and break his trust, but also gauge what your child is ready to understand. Be prepared for tough questions. My youngest child asked me after 9-11, "Mommy, are you going to remarry if Daddy dies?" This question came out of the blue.

Enlist your child's help with the home and plans. When my husband was in Kuwait, several things happened that impacted my older son for which he had no control. I felt that he would be happier and would gain self-esteem if I gave him the opportunity to make an important decision for himself and I was right.

Noble cause. Teach your children that their servicemember parent is serving the country and that this is an important job to the nation. Help them understand

that they too are serving our nation. This service is very honorable.
